## Visit to Phillip Green Memorial School Garden, Boveridge, Dorset.



On 4<sup>th</sup> June a party of members travelled to Dorset to visit this Garden and were looking forward to a guided tour by Chris Beardshaw.

At the last moment we heard that Chris had injured his ankle and was unable to attend. We hope that he has made a full recovery.

Arrangements were made for the Head Teacher at the School, Lesley Walker, to lead a tour of the Garden. The House shown in the photograph was built in about 1800 and after various owners it became a boarding school for children with learning difficulties in the 1960s. The School was taken over by the Phillip Green Memorial Trust in 1998. Until 1998 it had not been appreciated that a major garden makeover had been carried out by Gertrude Jekyll to a plan by Thomas Mawson and it was then decided with the help and encouragement of Chris Beardshaw to attempt to restore it to its original design. The members were able to tour the garden and enjoy seeing the work carried out by Chris and his team, which included some of the boys at the school.

## Planning Application for the construction of housing in the Walled Garden.

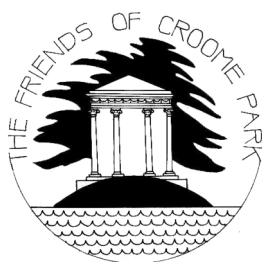

In addition to this there will be a short presentation on the LHI Project when we will be told of the progress so far and given a taste of some of the material collected during the interviews.

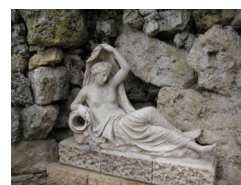
